














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
AUGUST ENGLISH Preparation Program

The first day of school can be unnerving for any student, but especially for newly arrived international students, who face the mysteries of a new culture, immersion in English, and having to build a new circle of friends. The native English environment can be especially challenging for a newly arrived international student. "Wow, people here talk so quickly!" and "Canadians use many expressions that I have never heard before!" are comments we often hear from students when they first arrive.

The August English Preparation Program is designed to prepare international students into their new surroundings so that, in September, they can start school with confidence. This program is offered exclusively to our students attending Limestone area schools in September. The program introduces students to the colloquial English expressions they will not likely have heard in their home country, and the academic English they will encounter in their new Canadian classrooms. Students will learn about the culture and expectations of Canadian schools, and discuss them in relation to those in their home country. The program instructor will work with students to develop strategies on how to be successful in their new Limestone school. With a class size of about 15, the program offers students a high level of individualized attention.

In addition, many of the program activities will take place outside of the classroom. They are designed to familiarize students with various services and venues around Kingston. This will include riding and understanding the public transit system, how to order food, what to do with phone plans, banking and Canadian courtesy. There are many local experiences included in this program!





ONE-SEMESTER School (5 months)

Secondary school students have the option of enrolling for a **single semester**. Students enrolling for a one semester experience will take four credits in school and be eligible for activity trips and participate fully in school teams and clubs.

FULL-YEAR School (10 months)

The Limestone District School Board hosts students from grades 7-12 in Full Year Programs. Students begin school in September and complete their year at the end of June. Secondary school students have the option of enrolling looking to graduate from Ontario and looking to earn an Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD).

SCHOOL FACTS

In Ontario secondary schools there are two semesters in the school year, each semester has 87 instructional days. Semester 1 is from September to the end of January, and Semester 2 is from February to the end ofJune.



Ontario High School graduation requirements

- ✓ Successful completion of the **Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test** (OSSLT);
- ✓ A minimum of **5 hours of voluntary community service** for each semester you are a registered student or a total of 40 hours. (See student services for a list of community organizations);
- A minimum of 30 credit (each course = one credit) of which 18 courses are mandatory. Your prior learning will be evaluated and course equivalencies awarded by guidance staff. Students requiring **ESL courses** will graduate with more credits, and that is perfectly normal.

ASSESSMENT AND ACADEMIC HONESTY

Teachers will assess your work based on completion of assignments, presentations and tests. If you have difficulty in completing your assignments or need extra time talk to your teacher before the assignment or project is due. The teacher may allow extra time or offer you some help. Teachers will also evaluate your work based on your work habits and learning skills. There are three (3) types of assessment:

- ✓ Diagnostic what you already know at the start of the course;
- ✓ Formative An attempt to 'practice' or show what you have learned to a point. You will get feedback on this formative work to reflect on and make your Summative better.
- ✓ **Summative** Your best and final understanding on concepts being taught.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance at all school classes is mandatory (required) unless you have a valid reason not to be there; such as illness or appointment. Your homestay or you (if over 18 years of age), must notify the attendance office of your school if you will not be at school. Your attendance is recorded at every period and your homestay will be called and emailed if you are not in class. Your achievement is directly related to attendance and that is why you are here!

SECONDARY SCHOOL TIMETABLE

While the start and end of the school day will vary from school to school. A typical day would be from 8:15 AM to 2:35 PM. Second-


SCHOOL RULES

You will make friends at school if you have a positive attitude. You will find Canadians as very accepting and open students that will help you navigate school. Here are some expectations that staff and students have for you at a Canadian school.

- ☑ Be at school on time:
- ☑ Be respectful to teachers and staff; to your friends and classmates;
- ☑ There is zero tolerance for Abuse or harassment of any kind including: verbal & physical abuse, physical or cyber-bullying, and sexual harassment at any time in school or in your homestay. If you feel like a victim of abuse, report it to your teacher, Homestay Coordinator or homestay family;
- ✓ Cell phone use is not allowed during class times.









REFUND POLICY

WITHDRAWALS DUE TO STUDY PERMIT OR VISA REASONS:

- New applicants: A full refund, less a \$500 administration fee, will be granted if a study permit application is not approved by Citizenship and Immigration Canada.
- Returning students: A full refund, less a \$100 administration fee, will be granted if a study permit application is not approved by Citizenship and Immigration Canada.

Requests for refunds must be submitted in writing. They must include the original rejection letter from Citizenship and Immigration Canada and the original Letter of Acceptance from Limestone District School Board.

VOLUNTARY AND INVOLUNTARY WITHDRAWALS:

- Two-thirds of the tuition fee will be refunded if the student withdraws prior to the first day of the semester.
- One-half of the tuition fee will be refunded if the student withdraws at any time during the first calendar month of the semester (i.e., September or February).
- Tuition fees will not be refunded if the student:
 - Withdraws after the first calendar month of the program;
 - Is withdrawn from the program due to a violation of the participation agreement, school rules, or Canadian law.



STUDY PERMITS AND VISAS

Students are responsible for ensuring that their study permits and visas are current. You are responsible for applying for renewal of your study permit at least three months before the expiry date. You can renew your study permit online at http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/ study/study-extend.asp. You will need to submit letter of acceptance from the International Education office, photo identification, as well as copies of your passport and visa. The documents you need to enter Canada are:

- ✓ a valid passport or travel document;
- ☑ a valid temporary resident visa (if required);
- ✓ the letter of introduction from the visa office that you received when your study permit was approved (this letter contains your permit reference number and the CBSA officer needs this letter to issue your study permit);
- ☑ a copy of the letter of acceptance from the school at which you are permitted to study;
- ✓ proof that you have enough money to support yourself during your stay in Canada;
- ✓ Letters of reference or any other documents recommended by the visa office where you applied.

The CBSA officer will ask to see your travel documents when you arrive in Canada. Make sure they are with you and not packed in your luggage. This will help speed up your entry to Canada. Carry these items and all other valuable papers, cash and traveller's cheques with you at all times. Do not put them in your checked luggage. If any of your documents are missing or if any of the information on your application or letters of reference is incorrect, it is possible you will be ineligible to enter into Canada.

Possession of these documents does not guarantee entry. All persons must establish that they meet all the requirements of the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act and Regulations before being authorized to enter or re-enter Canada. If there are no problems at the point of entry, the officer will let you enter Canada and will issue your study permit. You should:

- ✓ Check the study permit to make sure your personal information is accurate and;
- ☑ Check the expiry date on your study permit. You must leave Canada by this date.

NOTE: some countries require a temporary residence visa in order to return to Canada.

HEALTH INSURANCE

All international students who stay in a Limestone homestay must purchase health insurance through the International Education Office. Insurance forms, and instructions on what to do if a student needs medical care in Canada, are issued to all international students upon their arrival in Kingston. International Education Office staff work closely with students and their homestay families in the event that a student needs medical attention and submits an insurance claim.



CUSTODIANSHIP

International students under the age of 18 who live and study in Canada without a parent must declare a legal custodian who lives in Ontario (and in some cases, lives close to Kingston). A custodian is a Canadian citizen, or permanent resident of Canada, who takes legal responsibility of minor children. Applicants may declare a family member or friend as a legal custodian. Limestone District School Board provides legal custodianship to international students who do not have such a person in Canada.

NOTE: the preparation timetable suggested is based on a regular workflow. Please observe the processing time can take anywhere from a couple weeks to many months, depending on your home country and particular circumstances.



STUDENT SUPPORT

Supporting international students comes hand-in-hand with homestay. Having hosted international students for over two decades, we understand the impact on students of studying abroad. On one hand, it is an exciting, life-changing experience. On the other hand, there are many challenges: being away from family and friends, living with a new "family" in an unfamiliar culture, and being expected to perform well in school in a new language. We understand this and will help make the transition a smooth process... it is what we do every year!

EXPECTATIONS OF HOMESTAY

Limestone expects homestay families to treat their host student just like one of their own children. International students are expected to be included in all regular family activities, such as meals, outings or trips, and recreation. Families monitor student achievement at school and advocate for students when required, such as at school or in the community.

INTERNAL HOMESTAY PROGRAM

Limestone runs its own homestay program. The advantage? Better quality student sup-





port. Limestone dedicates two full-time employees to support its international homestay students. As regular employees of the school district, they have open access to schools. This allows them to see our students, and their school counsellors, almost every day, resulting in closer relationships with them and a better understanding of their needs. In practice, it is a round-the-clock responsibility that is taken seriously and proudly by our coordinators.

HOMESTAY FAMILIES

We select the majority of our homestay families by referrals from within our trusted network of existing homestay families and their friends. Each homestay applicant is carefully screened to ensure their home is clean and meets proper safety standards. Most importantly, the family must be motivated by the idea of providing support and care to an international student, not simply a bedroom and meals. All applicants undergo police background checks, which must be updated every two years. All homestay families are visited by our staff in Limestone periodically and develop an excellent relationship as part of the International team.



PLANNING FOR YOUR ARRIVAL IN CANADA


Once you receive your letter of acceptance, there are many things you will need do before your arrival in Kingston. This is the time to make sure you have all required documentation, including passport, study permit, visa, original signed, stamped transcripts from school and your original immunization record. You should start to communicate with your new homestay family by email, Facebook or Skype once you receive

your homestay profile. Each school will have their **own website** and it is important that you visit that site to learn more about your school and the opportunities it offers. Most schools have **orientations planned** for the last week of August. It is very important that you notify the International Education office about your **flight information** and **travel arrangements** as soon as you have booked your flight.

CITY OF KINGSTON







With a population of approximately 125,000, Kingston combines a small-town feel with many big-city amenities. Our city is located at the mouth of Lake Ontario, where the St. Lawrence River and Cataragui River meets. Kingston is minutes away from the world-famous Thousand Islands and the Rideau Canal (a UNESCO World Heritage site). Large Canadian cities; Toronto, Montreal and Ottawa are all less than a three hour drive away. Kingston is a stunning, historic city that consistently ranks as one of the most beautiful and desirable places to live in Canada. Kingston has a vibrant music, festival, arts and 'foodie' scene Kingston also boasts the most restaurants per capita in Canada. A sparkling waterfront, nature trails and parks are all here!

As the home of Queen's University, Royal Military College of Canada, and St. Lawrence College, Kingston attracts many top students from across Canada and around the world. helping to make Kingston a vibrant, innovative community. Kingston has the most PhD graduates per capita making us the "smartest" workforce in Canada. Kingston is home to a wealth of burgeoning green technologies and alternate energy sectors, and was the first Canadian city to adopt a sustainable energy procurement protocol. While Kingston's high quality of life and educational opportunities attract people from around the world, English is the dominant language spoken in Kingston.

Kingston is home to several UNESCO World Heritage sites; Fort Henry, the Kingston Fortifications and the Rideau Canal, Bellevue House was the home of Sir John A. Macdonald, the father of Confederation and Canada's first Prime Minister. Kingston has well as a wealth of museums and the best freshwater sailing harbour in North America.

CITY OF KINGSTON









Canadians love to talk about the weather! Kingston has a humid continental climate with warm summers. The temperature ranges from an average low in January of -7c to an average high in July of 22c. Kingston has four distinct seasons: winter, spring, summer and fall.

WINTER (DEC. 21 TO MARCH 20)

Kingston can receive a lot of snow depending on the year and the weather can be unpredictable. Winter temperatures average between -12 Celsius and 2 Celsius but can sometimes drop below -20 Celsius especially with the wind chill. It is important to be prepared for winter weather and to dress warmly in a winter coat and boots, with a hat, scarf and gloves or mittens. You will need to purchase winter clothing after you arrive in Canada.

SPRING (MARCH 20 TO JUNE 21)


Brings warmer weather. The snow and ice begin to melt and you can put away your winter clothing, although sometimes you will still need wear a light jacket, and it can be damp. Spring temperatures average between -1 Celsius in March and 22 Celsius in June. In the Spring Kingston gets an average of 8 rainy days per month.

SUMMER (JUNE 21 TO SEPT. 21)

Average temperatures range from **15 to 25 Celsius**. Clothing is lighter, and sunscreen is a necessity during the day. In the summer months shorts and sandals are commonly worn as the summer is much warmer.

FALL (SEPT. 22 TO DEC. 20)

Brings cooler weather and warmer clothing. September and October are truly beautiful months as the leaves change colour and it is still warm during the day. It is common to see snow in November. Temperatures during the fall months' average between 1 Celsius and 19 Celsius.





JÚLIA DA COSTA DIAS COELHO

In September, I had the greatest experience of my life. I went to Canada to live for five months with a homestay family and to study in a Canadian high school. I've been blessed to stay with such an amazing family and meet great people from all around the world. At first it was weird not being in your own country, eating different food and experiencing new customs. But I got used to it with time. I thought the school experience was very interesting.
